‘A NATION’S THANK YOU – THE PEOPLE’S PROCESSION’

On Sunday 11th November 2018 the wreath shown on the front cover will be carried on the march down Whitehall and will be laid on the Cenotaph by Debra and Mike Collins. The citation attached to the wreath will include 32 villagers who served during the First World War and whose names appear on the Roll of Honour which hangs in the Church as a memorial (see next pages of this edition).

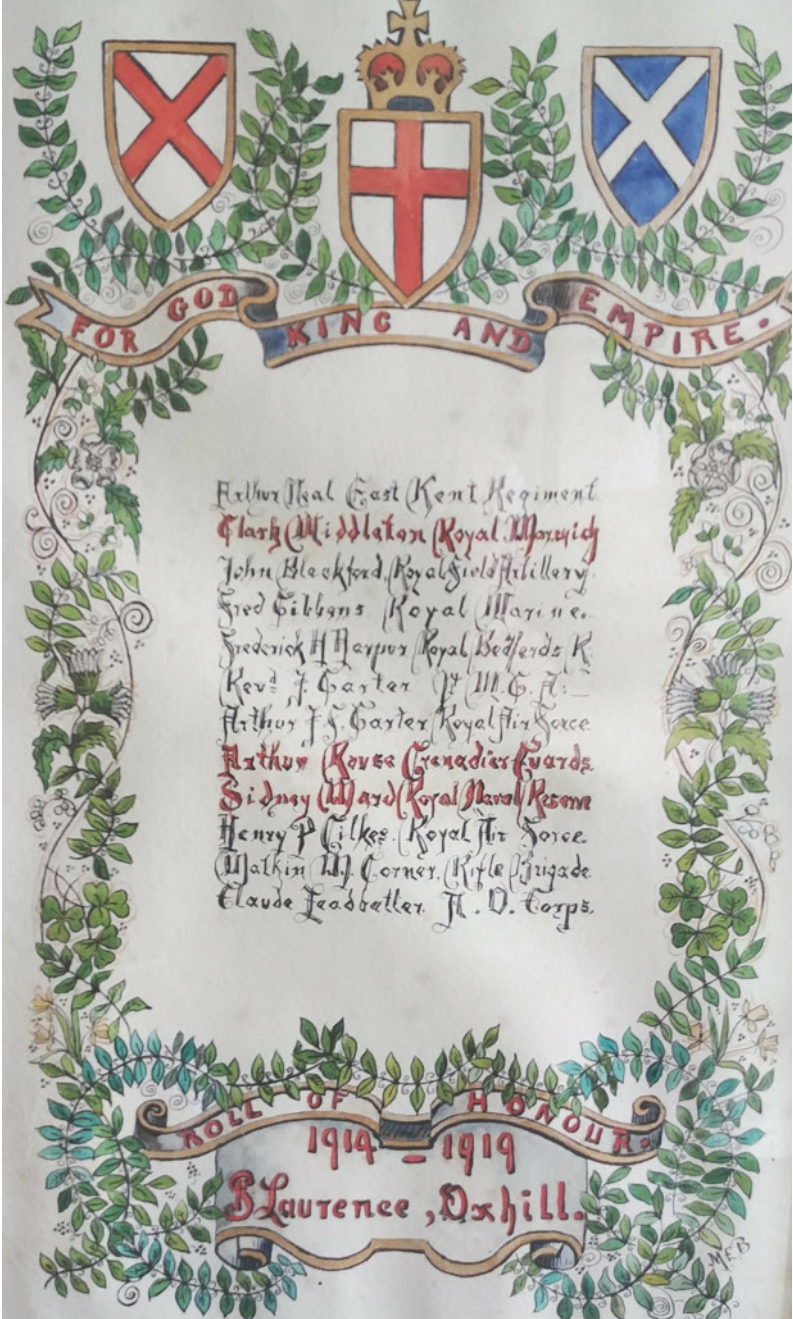
The wreath will be dedicated during the 9:30 All Saints & All Souls service at St Lawrence Church on Sunday 4th November and remain on display guarded by a ‘Tommy’ until the following Thursday.

On Remembrance Sunday 11th November the bells of St Lawrence will ring out with many other peals across the country to replicate the spontaneous outpouring of relief that took place in 1918. As news of the Armistice Spread, church bells, which had fallen silent across the UK during the First World War, rang out in celebration.

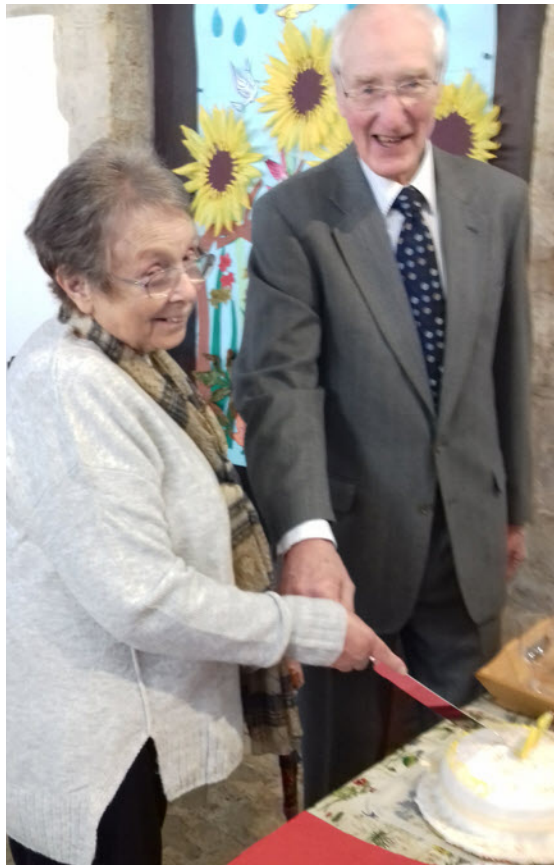

NASA HAS UNCOVERED EVIDENCE THAT GRAVITY IS VITAL TO THE DEVELOPMENT AND EVOLUTION OF LIFE ON EARTH

Which of these do you think is the greatest threat to life on Earth: global warming, overpopulation or war?

Not overpopulation, but its macabre solution, eugenics, is the greatest threat to human existence. The proponents of eugenics keep a very low profile but such was not always the case.

Plato said, “Human reproduction should be controlled by the state” and out of his Orwellian philosophy sprang governmental legal sterilization.

The United States was the first country to undertake sterilization programs for the purpose of eugenics. In 1907, Indiana became the first state to enact legal sterilization, followed closely by California and Washington. Several other states followed.

Eugenics, the agenda of genocidal tyrants, was driven underground after World War II due to Nazi extermination policies. But Eugenacists are cunning in concealing their agenda, therefore, in the 1960’s eugenics was renamed ‘Behaviour Genetics’.

Eugenics groups are repeatedly being forced to reinvent themselves, for example, the Oregon Board of Eugenics who performed their last forced sterilization in 1981, was renamed the ‘Board of Social Protection’ and when “Behaviour Genetics” was outed as a eugenics program it renamed itself “Family Planning.”

You may be asking yourself, “Where is this article going? What does eugenics have to do with NASA?”

On 29 July 1958, President Dwight Eisenhower established NASA with a distinctly civilian orientation. Billions of dollars were poured into Public Relations programs to portray space travel as a brave adventure into the unknown, blackness of space and to encourage us to regard astronauts as heroes.

However, NASA’s scientists know that space travel is ruinous for human biology and with that knowledge now in the public domain, NASA wants to biologically engineer would-be astronauts.

NASA's biologically engineered humans would be curtains for the future of the human race.

At first glance, NASA's genetically altered astronauts do not appear to be the product of eugenics because NASA would not be forcibly sterilizing them: space itself would take care of that.

According to NASA employee, Dr Joseph Tash, the testes and the ovarian cells are the first to be damaged in space. Space causes infertility by damaging male and female reproductive organs and destroying sperm cells and ovarian cells.

Now if that's not eugenics, what is?

NASA has deceptively offered to freeze the sperm cells and ovarian cells of astronauts, knowing that female astronauts will not have viable ovarian cells and male astronauts will be shooting blanks.

However, frozen cells are not a solution because a female astronaut returns to Earth with a permanently disrupted hormonal system and damaged reproductive organs. When a species cannot reproduce its days are numbered.

For humanity to undertake space travel is to stare extinction in the face.

In conclusion, it is a well documented scientific fact that spaceflight damages reproductive function in both men and women by disrupting steroid receptor signalling pathways.

But it seems sterility is not enough to put an end to the space program, after all, it has been known since the 1960s that spaceflight accelerates the aging process and that hasn't stopped NASA. Studies have identified significant age-related alterations in estrogen receptor signalling in many major organ systems. Altered estrogen receptor signalling not only accelerates the aging processes, it also weakens bones. Bone density is maintained by estrogen in both men and women and estrogen disruption is known to weaken bones.

Spaceflight-induced sterility, reduced bone density and accelerated aging have not deterred NASA's space program because space technology brings in buckets of money. The obvious Armageddon implications of human sterility and bioengineered humans are ignored as NASA chases a budget of 9.9 billion per year.

HELP SAVE BRITAIN'S HEDGEHOGS WITH 'HEDGEHOG HIGHWAYS'!

Hedgehogs in the UK are in serious trouble. Repeated studies have shown that the nation's favourite animal is being wiped out. But there is something we can do to save them.

I'm an ecologist and author and I've been studying hedgehogs for over 30 years. I know that a key cause of them dying out is that our landscapes are being fenced off into ever smaller fragments. We need to make sure new housing developments include 'hedgehog highways' - a 13 cm hole in the bottom of a fence that allows hedgehogs to move freely between gardens to find food and find a mate.

This simple move would have a big impact on the UK's hedgehogs - and it's cheap and easy for developers to carry out.

So I'm calling upon government to ensure every new housing development builds in these holes for hedgehog highways. This will allow gardens to be connected, creating the pathways they need to survive.

We can't sit back and let hedgehog numbers keep plummeting. It's estimated that numbers are already down 95% since the 1950s. We have to act now.

Please sign here to call on the Ministry of Housing and Planning to make hedgehog highways a legal requirement of new builds.

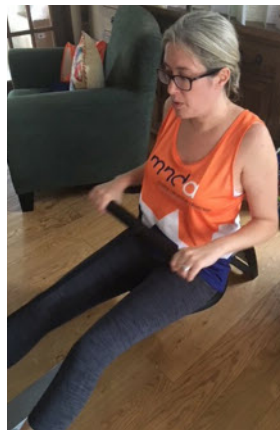

TYSOE WI DECORATE VILLAGE CHURCH WITH POPPIES FOR FESTIVAL OF REMEMBRANCE

The ladies from Tysoe Women's Institute (WI) are staging a Festival of Remembrance in St Mary's Church in Tysoe Village from 6th to 19th November to mark when the guns fell silent across Europe as the Armistice was signed and the First World War was over.

They will be decorating the medieval church with hundreds of handmade poppies as a mark of respect for those who lost their lives in WW1, including 20 people from the village and the neighbouring village of Compton Wynates, who have their names listed on a memorial in the centre of the village green.

They will also be hosting a coffee morning in the Main Street based church on Saturday 10th November between 11am and 3pm to raise funds for the Royal British Legion and everyone is invited to join the WI ladies for refreshments and lots of homemade cake.

Tysoe WI President Jacqueline Franklin said:

“We've been very busy making hundreds of poppies to decorate our Church and it should be quite a spectacular sight. The poppies are being entirely crafted by our members from a variety of mediums including paper, wool, paint and felt.”

“We hope lots of people will come along and see the tribute, along with a display from the local history group that includes photos and information relating to the village during this period.”

There was a special service in school when children from Brailes School presented the cross of nails, which is on a pilgrimage to visit seventy-five schools. The cross is made out of nails from the old Coventry Cathedral, bombed during the WW2, and now offers a message of reconciliation. Later, the cross was taken to The Dasset School for the next stage in its journey. The School Council were thrilled to receive a small replica cross in return, now proudly displayed during our assemblies.



New Benches Funded by NFU Mutual

We have been very lucky to be awarded a donation of £250 from the Community Giving Fund of NFU Mutual that provided two wooden benches for the playground. The seats were the finishing touch to improve this area following garden work, installation of new fascia and the repainting of some walls. All the changes make this a lovely area which is really appreciated by the children.

Many extra-curricular opportunities have provided engaging learning experiences. Silver Birch Class had a World War Two Day when a historian visited the school, together with his vast collection of resources, including gas masks and ration books.
