OXHILL GARDEN CLUB AND VILLAGE TRIP TO AEROSPACE BRISTOL AND DYRHAM PARK



The annual day trip to Aerospace Bristol and Dyrham Park took place on the 8th August with 28 guests from Oxhill and surrounding villages travelling with Johnsons Coaches.

Our first stop was to Filton, Bristol to the Aerospace Museum. The exhibition covers the history of aviation and skills from the earliest aeroplanes to space technology and the supersonic Concorde.



The museum explores the vital role through more than a century of aviation and engineering skills, with many exhibits and interactive screens to test your reactions and skills.

This year marks the 50th Anniversary of Concorde's maiden flight from Toulouse on 2nd March 1969 and the first British flight from Filton, Bristol on the 9th April 1969.

The highlight of the visit was to step aboard and explore the flight deck and passenger cabin of Concorde Alpha Foxtrot which was the last iconic supersonic passenger jet, in its full passenger ready state.

Concorde was able to cross the Atlantic in under 3 hours, cruising at over twice the speed of sound and reach an altitude of 60,000 feet. This would enable passengers to view the curvature of the earth and see a purple-black sky - a sight never to be forgotten.



After lunch we travelled on to the National Trust property Dyrham Park in South Gloucestershire built by William Blathwayt.

Some energetic members took the 15 minute walk downhill to the house and gardens whilst others took the shuttle bus down the picturesque winding drive through part of the 270 acre ancient deer park to view the 17th century house containing artwork, ceramics, furniture and Delftware, St Peter's Church, formal gardens, pool gardens and woodlands.

During the journey home we were entertained by Derek Harbour on his experience of a Concorde trip and Peter Britton on his experience encountering Concorde's inaugural flight as a co-pilot on a military transport plane.

THE PIED PIPER

In the ensuing months they prepared the site for building 4 five bedroom houses. Hardly social housing I think.

This involved mega vibrations which I felt for months, whilst they prepared the foundations for said properties. This also included noise and air pollution.

However insurance for this type of damage always has an excess which I will have to pay. I would be interested to know of any instances of Clay Heave in the village.

Finally when the council tells you it will be OK. Don't listen. They are as ignorant as I was.

In summary Piper Homes, several residents, ex residents and landowners have trousered pockets of cash in this process. It takes two to Tango. You may want to thank them for our new village.....or not.

OXHILL VS TYSOE ANNUAL CRICKET MATCH

The annual cricket match was held at Tysoe Sports Ground on Sunday August 18th. The weather was kind to us. Although it didn't rain, pullovers and / or beer coats were required in the latter part of the afternoon.

The Oxhill team fielded a side with average age lower than that of recent years. This year Oxhill has played several local sides and won their first game against Long Compton amassing 159-4 off 35 overs and bowling them out for 102!!

For those who weren't at the game, here's a brief summary of the rules:

- 25 overs for each side.
- Batsmen retire when they get 25 runs.
- Bowling rotates through each side, with just one over per bowler.

Very wisely the groundsmen had put the spectators several metres back from the boundary. Fours and sixes were being frequently hit, and with 'health and safety' in mind the crowd didn't want to be too close to the batsmen.

Tysoe won the toss and elected to bat. They made 136-8. An achievable target! Oxhill did excellent fielding during the Tysoe innings. Our captain David Whittaker dropped a catch and injured his finger in the process but played on - a trip to A&E on Monday concluded that he had actually broken his finger!!

Then it was Oxhill's turn. It was a slow start characterised by shocking bowling from Tysoe meaning a lot of extra runs were scored. Oxhill started to close the gap and improve the run rate but couldn't quite catch up, losing by 6 runs. Dave the captain got his 25, there was an unfortunate run out early on though the target got steadily closer. It ended with a tense time in the last over as we saw Oxhill's final score rising to 130-6.

But it had been a close fought match, and shows what must happen fairly soon when one year Oxhill wins.

There are two more matches this year: against Ebrington at Radway on Sept 8th, and against Long Compton on Sept 29th.

RECENT ANTI SPEEDING MEASURES IN OXHILL

Whilst I thought the use of the word “rape” in a headline to an article referring to the abuse of villages by highway authorities, to be out of context, objectionable and wholly inappropriate, I did read on.

Signs, like words, matter. To assume that all people who fail to take notice of signage, will continue to do so irrespective of prominence and pertinence, fundamentally misunderstands triggers of human behaviour.

Our actions are often governed by subliminal messages relating to visual clues of danger for example. Things like "dragons teeth", white gates (like those on the verge entering Tysoe from Oxhill) create a perception of the road narrowing, whilst signs on the road add to the feeling that a threshold is being crossed.

Yes these may fade in time, but hopefully exercising some caution in these places will become an embedded behaviour for many, although granted, not all.

I live in an area of the village which suffers with the problem of speeding. Since the new signs were added, I can testify, that things have definitely improved. Many now perceive the village threshold to be where the dragons teeth are, and not further on, where housing becomes more prominent on both sides of the road.

There is no single measure that will resolve the problem completely, so only incremental improvements can be expected. This is a step in the right direction. I for one, welcome the attempts to do something about the issue of speeding, and would like to thank all of those involved in bringing about this change.

NATIONAL PORTRAIT GALLERY PARTNERSHIP EXHIBITION COMES TO UPTON HOUSE AND GARDENS

From 21 September – 9 December 2019, visitors will be able to see “Faces of Change: Nature’s Champions” at National Trust property Upton House and Gardens

Faces of Change ‘Nature’s Champions’ is a partnership between the National Trust and the National Portrait Gallery drawing on portraits from the Gallery’s Collection. It focuses on individuals who have transformed the way we perceive, experience, and aim to protect the natural world.

Featured sitters include environmental activists, scientists, poets, politicians, campaigners, gardeners and broadcasters who have affected how we interact with our environment. The exhibition includes outstanding paintings, sculptures, photographs and recent commissions.

From broadcaster Sir David Attenborough, to the author of *My Family and Other Animals*, Gerald Durrell, visitors will have the chance to get up close and personal with the faces of those who’ve shaped the world we live in and discover their green legacy.

Other champions featured in the exhibition include *Gardeners’ World* presenter Roy Lancaster, who travelled the world on plant-finding expeditions, and environmentalist and champion of organic farming and gardening, Prince Charles.

A painting of one of the founders of the National Trust, Octavia Hill, will also be on display along with a portrait of children’s writer, artist and conservationist Beatrix Potter. Other recognisable faces include: Dame Vivienne Westwood and The Clash front man, Joe Strummer.

To complement the exhibition, the house team will also be highlighting landscape paintings from 2nd Viscount Bearsted’s extensive collection in the ‘picture in focus’ display in the sitting room. This display will allow visitors to explore how artists’ vision of the natural world has changed over time.

Annie Reilly, Acting Head of Public Programmes at the National Trust comments:

“For many years, we have enjoyed a successful partnership with the National Portrait Gallery showcasing portraits from their collection to visitors at Trust places. Last year saw the development of this partnership with a touring exhibition to commemorate the women’s suffrage anniversary, which was the start of our Faces of Change series of exhibitions.

“We are looking forward to continuing this partnership with the ‘Nature’s Champions’ exhibition which will invite visitors of all ages to discover or learn more about some of the leading figures, past and present, who have played a key role in promoting and protecting the natural world.”

Rab MacGibbon, Curator, 17th & 18th Centuries Collections, National Portrait Gallery adds:

“We’re delighted to continue to partner with the National Trust on the Faces of Change exhibitions and to be able to bring our Collection to three new National Trust places, this time to celebrate the champions of the natural world. This exhibition is a call to arms for nature. Come and be inspired by coming face to face with key figures from the environmental movement. We can’t all be a Jane Goodall or David Attenborough, but we can ask ourselves what actions we are taking in our daily lives to help protect the planet for the benefit of all its inhabitants and for future generations. We can all be Nature Champions!”

The partnership exhibition has already visited Dunham Massey and Attingham Park. At each of the properties, young people were consulted in the selection of works and have contributed to the exhibition content. Whilst the exhibition is at Upton, children will be invited to create a postcard featuring their favourite landscape. These postcards will then be displayed in the Pavilion alongside artwork by students from Banbury Art College.
